Writing guidance:

Using exclamation marks:

To show anger: I hate you!

To show joy: Those flowers are so lovely!

To show surprise or excitement: I can't believe that you came first!

To show urgency: Please help me!

We also use exclamation marks in exclamation sentences: What a hot day it is! How fast he ran!

Using Question marks:

To end a sentence which poses a question: Do you like marmite?

Questioning words: how, why, where, when, who and what.

Notice the spelling of the WH question words.

Remember a rhetorical question does not need answering: (Miss Brown's mum used to use this one a lot) 'Do I look like a maid to you?'

Using commas:

To separate items in a list:

There is a choice of turkey, beef, fish or veggie bake.

To separate clauses when you have started a sentence with a <u>subordinating</u> <u>conjunction</u> (but never AND, BUT or BECAUSE!).

<u>When</u> I learnt how to tie my tie<mark>,</mark> I felt delighted. <u>Before</u> I started my one page profile, I carefully thought and talked about what I would like to include.

Never use a comma in a middle of a sentence if the <u>subordinating conjunction</u> is in the middle.

E.g. I carefully thought and talked about what to include before I completed my one page profile.

Using full stops:

To show the end of a sentence: I think dogs are great.
