How was rationing sold to the people of Britain?

On the 8th of January 1940 ~~months~~ after the beginning of World War two ~~two~~ for a thing something that known as rationing.

Rationing was was was a new way to save things such as petrol, furniture, food and clothing. When you were to get your rationing food you would receive one fresh egg, 2 oz butter, 2 oz tea, 1 oz cheese, 8 oz sugar, 4 rashers of bacon and 4 oz margarine (oz = ounces). They rationed because during the war food good supplies were ~~limited~~ ^{limited}. If you were a babie, pregnant or sick you would receive more milk, orange juice and cod liver oil. You would also get first of choice of fruit. ☆

Rationing books were things that you ~~could~~ ^{would} have so every so one person does not take every thing in the shop. ~~For~~ ^{Every} Occasionally someone would go over to a shop and get the items and once you have done your shopping the person at the till would stamp or cut out that day or week. An adult would have 60 coupons to go shopping a year but was later changed to 48. Children would have an additional 10 coupons for clothes. People were allowed to buy one set of new clothes. Every page was a different colour so that would not use them up in a week.
