December 15th 1915

Dear Diary

Thank the Lord Endurance is so robust or we would be matchsticks already. Having entered the Weddell Sea a few ~~week~~ weeks beforehand, we have ~~ente~~ come face to face with Antarctica's pack ice. Never before, had I seen something so vast nor so gobsmacking. At first, it was fun and games but after ~~spare~~ spending all morning ~~to~~ freeing Endurance from yet another mishap, the pack ice became somewhat of a worry.

January 7th 1916

Today, ~~my~~ our rations dropped yet again. However, food was not to be moaned over. Everyone was expected to do their bit whether it was gruelling hours of hacking at the ice or hunting seals, we were a team. With Killer Whales tracing our footsteps danger was always lurking whether we liked it or not. Not once was there a chance of pointing towards rest, we worked as hard as our human physique would allow us. Somewhat glustered, I settled for a well deserved nights sleep.

November 21st 1916

Today, I woke up to find Endurance on a thirty

degree angle. However this was not all, it appeared that my bed was afloat! The walls were beginning to cave in and my first thought was to escape the room but due to it being mid winter, this task was proven impossible. Eventually, Shackleton let us out to find every ~~for~~ person in his crew swimming and almost frozen to death with a serious case of hypothermia.

December 1st 1916

Dear diary,

No more do we have access to the beloved Endurance for Antarctica won the battle and has taken her as prisoner. Sucked deep into the ~~to~~ depth of the Weddell Sea a piece of her remains lies in my pocket (the one without any spoons). My friends and I both share a tent at camp and soon, we shall continue the treacherous journey and head home.
