

Hello Year 4,

We wanted to write an explanation of the dots and dashes spelling activity as there is a commonly occurring mistake where blends and digraphs are being confused.

Digraphs are two letters that make just one sound. ... ch in the word chair and ph in the word phone are both examples of digraphs. Blends, on the other hand, are two or more consonants that BLEND together but each sound can still be heard. For instance, the words skirt and clock start with the blends sk and cl.

When we complete the dots and dashes exercise the symbols mean the following:

The single dot under a letter signifies that a sound in a word is represented by a single letter. An example of this is the word dog. Dog will have a dot under each letter as there are three sounds in the word dog (the d sound, the o sound and the g sound).

The dash is when we start to have more than one letter representing a sound. An example of this is the word dash (the d is a sound represented by a dot under the d, the a is a sound represented by the dot under the a and the sh digraph is represented with the line under the s and h.

The curved line comes into use when there is something called a split digraph or as it's sometimes called a bossy/magic e. The word dive is a perfect example of this. We would use a curved line to connect the i and the e (skipping the v) as the job of the e is to influence the i to make it a long vowel sound. So Dive will be a dot under the d, a curve from the i to the e, and a dot under the v.

The key is that it is about the sounds you can hear.

In many children's learning we see that students regularly made the prefixes a dash where the letters should each have a dot. In the mis prefix you can hear the m sound the i sound and the s sound, but the sounds are blended together. This is different to say the sh sound which is a single sound made by two letters. Essentially students are confusing a digraph for a blend.

In short use dots for blends and dashes for digraphs.

The newborn lambs were kept in an enclosure away from the other animals.

We can add suffixes to our words ending in zhuh spelt sure.

Did you notice that we had to **drop** the **e** before adding **-ing** and **-ed**? Remember, we always **drop** the **e** before adding a suffix beginning with a vowel.
